# 2025 Delta County Fair Grand Marshal

## BILL HUNT



Bill has called the North Fork Valley home for the past 60 years, with family roots in the area extending even further back. His grandfather, Cleo Hunt, served as a preacher at the First Baptist Church and was the town marshal in the 1950s. In 1965, Bill's parents, Roy and Frances, returned to the region. Roy constructed numerous houses and commercial buildings, while Frances became a beloved elementary teacher, cherished by many local children. Both Roy and Frances were long-time supporters of the fair, with Frances earning the title of Grand Champion flower exhibitor for several years.

In 1990, Bill took the reins of the family construction company, building homes and commercial properties across the western slope until he joined the Department of Corrections in 1998. He retired after 26 years as the Physical Plant Manager for the Delta and Rifle prisons.

For many years, Bill and his parents, along with occasionally his brothers, maintained a small herd of registered Simmental cattle, selling a few bulls each year through the Carsten Simmental sale. As the work with cattle became more demanding and Bill found it increasingly challenging to keep up, he transitioned to raising Boer goats to help local kids start showing goats.

Around 1995, Bill's children, Korina and Nikki, joined Delta County 4-H. Throughout their schooling years, they showcased animals from their own Bred and Fed herds. Trey joined the family a bit later and continued the tradition, even assisting in the establishment of the L Rd Boer goat herd. Naturally, Bill became a leader in 4-H and has continued in that role for the past 30 years. He feels he can't step back now, especially with his three grandchildren approaching the age to join! Bill has also served as a goat superintendent at the fair for many years and has lent his assistance in various other areas as needed. He has been a passionate advocate for the Bred and Fed program and currently holds the position of president of Delta County Bred and Fed, Inc.

Bill wishes to express his heartfelt gratitude for the opportunity to serve in such a generous community. In 2024, while battling cancer and undergoing a couple of surgeries, he experienced an outpouring of support from the area that is difficult to put into words.

## **OFFICIAL RULES AND REGULATIONS:**

### **SECTION 1 – GENERAL FAIR RULES AND REGULATIONS**

1. The 2025 Delta County Fair will be held July 26-August 3, 2025 at the Fairgrounds in Hotchkiss, Colorado. These rules shall serve as the Official Delta County Fair Rules and are available in the 2025 Fair Book and online at [www.deltacountyco.gov/924/Delta-County-Fair](http://www.deltacountyco.gov/924/Delta-County-Fair) The most up-to-date version of the official rules will be posted to the website and any rules on the website with a newer date than the ones in the Fair Book will take precedence.
2. **THESE RULES APPLY TO OPEN CLASS AND 4-H/FFA EXHIBITORS EQUALLY EXCEPT WHERE NOTED THAT RULES ARE FOR JUNIOR (4-H/FFA) DIVISION EXHIBITORS ONLY.** It is the responsibility of all exhibitors to know and adhere to all rules in their project/exhibit area(s).
3. Heritage Hall will be open as follows: Tuesday-Saturday of the fair – 8:00 AM-7:00 PM. Sunday of the fair – 8:00 AM – Noon.
4. Every article on exhibit must remain until the close of the fair. Removal will not be allowed until 8:00 AM on Sunday. Livestock (except horses, dogs and open class livestock) will be released after buy-back and processor load-out is completed on Sunday.
5. When no premiums are offered, space will be allotted, when possible, to those wishing to exhibit meritorious articles, and convenience offered for advertising.
6. **Superintendents have full control of the arrangement of articles in their departments and exhibitors will refer to them all matters relating to same. All livestock superintendents must be present and in charge of their species at load-out time.**
7. No one will be allowed to act as a judge in a class where he or she is an exhibitor.
8. Open Class Awards will be designated as follows: Blue ribbons indicate first place and a premium; Red ribbons indicate second place (no premium); White ribbons indicate third place (no premium). Rosette ribbons indicate Special Awards as per department. Ribbons will be placed at time of judging.
9. In the event there are no more than 5 exhibitors per species or division at the Delta County Fair, a local judge or Fair Board member will be retained to judge the classes relating to that species/division.
10. Each superintendent will exercise great care in preserving and returning all notebooks, registration sheets & records of results of his/her department because all payment of premiums are authorized only upon entries and results contained therein.
11. Premiums will be paid from 8:00 AM – 12:00 PM at the fairgrounds on the last Sunday of Fair. Premiums will be paid in cash except where otherwise noted. Special premiums will be paid in cash or merchandise at the option of persons offering same. Any and all premiums not picked up by 12:00 PM will be forfeited.
12. The Delta County Fair Board reserves the right to withhold premiums awarded in case of violation of any rule governing any department of the Delta County Fair.
13. **Dogs on grounds will be on a leash at all times. Dogs are not allowed in the exhibit or livestock areas. Competition dogs must stay in the competition area. Service dogs are exempted from this restriction however they must be on a leash. Livestock and horses will not be allowed in the concession area.**

14. The Fair Board will take every precaution for the safety of articles exhibited but does not assume any responsibility in case of loss or damage. All entries are accepted with the understanding that neither the show organization nor the sponsoring group shall be held responsible for any damage, accidents, or loss of livestock on exhibition or for sale.
15. Under no circumstances will any person or firm be allowed to place advertisements upon the buildings, trees, or any location on the fairgrounds without permission from the Delta County Fair Board.
16. With the exception of the Junior Market Livestock Sale, exhibits may not be marked for sale, nor is the sale of exhibits permitted at the fair.
17. **The City of Hotchkiss ordinance that prohibits the consumption of alcoholic beverages on public property will be enforced everywhere on the fairgrounds except in designated areas.**
18. In the absence of a specific rule, any dispute will be resolved by the Fair Board or its designated representative based upon other rules, customs and practice, and fairness.
19. **ALL DECISIONS OF THE JUDGES ARE FINAL.**
20. All exhibitors are expected to behave respectfully and in a courteous manner.
21. All exhibitors are expected to show respect for others and the property of others, including Heritage Hall exhibitors.
22. Unethical practices, such as violating exhibiting rules and regulations, removal of ribbons or registration forms, and misrepresentation of information concerning registration, will not be allowed.
23. Any individual or individuals found harassing livestock, causing any disturbance to livestock, causing harm to any livestock or other individual, or caught being responsible for theft on the fairgrounds, may be removed from the fairgrounds by the Delta County Fair Board and/or any security person. The person in question may not be allowed to return for the duration of the fair if so deemed by the Delta County Fair Board.
24. During the Delta County Fair motorized personal conveyances (i.e.: e-bikes, scooters, golf carts, gators, ATV's, electric chairs) on the Delta County Fairgrounds may be operated only by Fair Board members, office staff, designated fair officials, and handicapped participants/spectators.
25. **No bicycles, scooter, golf carts, ATV, electric chairs, ebikes, or other personal conveyances shall be allowed on the fairway, in or around the livestock barns, or in the tie out lot behind the beef barn at any time during the fair unless specifically approved by the Fair Board.**
26. False representation regarding any exhibit, interference with the judges, or unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of any exhibitor will be dealt with according to the rules of the Delta County Fair.
27. No unworthy animal or article shall be awarded a prize. In such cases the judges shall decide whether the animal or article is entitled to an award or not and, where there is no competition, premiums shall be awarded on merit. For example: where only one animal is exhibited in a class, first place money will be highest award if animal merits it, at the discretion of the judges; if said animal merits only a second, only second place money will be given, etc.
28. Any suggestion for improvement of the Fair should be presented to the department superintendent(s) or brought to the attention of the Fair Board by the September Fair Board meeting.

## SECTION 2 – CAMPING RULES

1. Camping, either on or behind the fairgrounds is free. However, every person in a camper (except vendors) is required to purchase an all-inclusive wristband that will allow entrance to all events. This is required to control access to events after hours.
2. Wrist bands will be available for purchase starting June 30, 2025 at the Extension Office at 525 Dodge St. Delta, CO. Wrist bands can also be purchased during fair at the Livestock Office on the Fairgrounds.
3. There is no charge for camping, but camping passes are required in all campers by the City of Hotchkiss. The camping pass must be displayed in a conspicuous place. Camping passes may be picked up at the Extension Office at 525 Dodge St. Delta, CO beginning on June 30, 2025, or may be picked up at the Livestock Office during the week of fair.
4. No open fires are allowed. No alcohol is allowed except in designated areas.
5. No generators after 10:00 PM.
6. Failure to obey camping regulations could result in the camper being asked to leave or having their camper removed from the fairgrounds.
7. **Minors camping on the fairgrounds must be always supervised by a responsible adult.**

## SECTION 3 ENTRY RULES/REQUIREMENTS

1. All 4-H & FFA members exhibiting in any class, group of classes or showmanship **MUST PRE-ENTER SUCH ENTRIES AND CLASSES ON OFFICIAL PRE-ENTRY FORMS AND DELIVER COMPLETED MARKET LIVESTOCK SALE INVITATION FORMS NO LATER THAN JUNE 20, 2025, AT 4:30 PM TO: CSU Extension Office, 525 Dodge Street, Delta CO 81416.** After that date no animals or classes may be added to entry.
2. One exhibitor must be declared for all animals nominated under the Family Nomination process by the pre-entry deadline. Animals cannot be pre-entered for more than one exhibitor. Any animals entered under more than one exhibitor at the time of the pre-entry deadline will be ineligible to show. **Pre-entries are final.**
3. **A copy of the BRAND INSPECTION papers for all BEEF BREEDING animals must accompany the pre-entry forms when turned into the CSU Extension Office on June 20 by 4:30 PM.** If they are not with the pre-entry paperwork, the exhibitors will not be allowed to show in the Beef Breeding show.
4. **ALL OPEN CLASS LIVESTOCK, INCLUDING POULTRY AND RABBITS, MUST PRE-ENTER SAID CLASSES.** Pre-entry forms are available at the CSU Extension Office at 525 Dodge Street, Delta, Colorado 81416 or online at [www.deltacountyco.gov/924/Delta-County-Fair](http://www.deltacountyco.gov/924/Delta-County-Fair). **PRE-ENTRIES ARE DUE BY June 20, 2025, at 4:30 PM to the CSU Extension Office.**
5. **ALL open class NON-LIVESTOCK entries will be made between 8:00 AM and 7:00 PM on Tuesday of the Delta County Fair on the Fairgrounds.** Use entry forms provided in this book. All entries must be in place by 7:00 PM on entry day, except for fresh fruits, vegetables, flowers, frozen goods, cream pies and baked items. These items must be to Heritage Hall no later than 8:00 AM on Wednesday of the fair.
6. To secure a premium, all articles must be properly entered.
7. Every animal or article shall be entered and exhibited in the name of its bon-a-fide owner except where noted.
8. **All Junior Division livestock entries must be weighed and stalled between their respective times according to the Official Fair Schedule.**

## **SECTION 4-GREIVANCES**

1. A person who considers himself/herself aggrieved is encouraged to first settle the matter informally. If such an attempt is not successful, grievances – including protests alleging unethical practices and rules violations – must be filed within one (1) hour of the conduct creating the grievance or alleged violation. Persons must file a written and signed grievance with the Delta County Fair Board President or designee, accompanied by a \$100 cash deposit or certified check, which will be forfeited if the grievance or protest is not sustained and returned if it is. The grievance shall plainly state the cause of the complaint and provide sufficient detail for the matter to be investigated. Upon receipt of the protest, the Fair Board President shall refer the protest to the remainder of the Fair Board, which shall investigate the matter and issue written findings within 24 hours of receipt. The findings of the Fair Board are final.
2. Grievances or other concerns involving a policy or practice of the Fair Board or the Fair, rather than relating to a specific incident shall be presented in writing to the Fair Board President for consideration by the Fair Board and/or Executive Committee and need not be acted upon within 24 hours. Any dispute that cannot be resolved by the species superintendent(s) will be taken to the Fair Board Executive Committee.

## **SECTION 5 – LIVESTOCK GENERAL RULES/REGULATIONS**

1. **THESE RULES/REGULATIONS ARE APPLICABLE TO BOTH OPEN CLASS AND 4-H/FFA (JUNIOR) EXHIBITORS EXCEPT WHERE NOTED.**
2. Any exhibitor found by the Delta County Fair Board to be not properly feeding or caring for his/her livestock will forfeit all premiums and awards.
3. All market livestock must be always controllable at initial and subsequent tag-in/weigh-ins and during the fair. For each species, “controllable” is at the discretion of the species superintendent, the general livestock superintendent, or a Delta County Fair Board member. If your animal is deemed uncontrollable, you must remove your animal from the fairgrounds within three hours of notification.
4. Any animal deemed unmanageable or unsafe by the species superintendent, general livestock superintendent, judge, or Delta County Fair Board member will be released and removed from the fairgrounds. The animal will be ineligible to show.
5. All livestock must meet Colorado Import requirements and Federal Interstate requirements. Any animal found showing evidence of infectious, contagious, or communicable disease or any animal deemed to be a present danger to the health, safety or welfare of the participants or spectators by the species superintendent will be immediately withdrawn from the show and the owner will take the animal home. The animal will not be able to sell through the Junior Market Livestock Sale.
6. No tranquilizers are allowed to be used on any livestock exhibited at the fair.
7. **Due to limited pen space, NO overnight accommodations will be made available to open class livestock.**
8. All open class livestock entries must be checked in at the Livestock Office two (2) hours prior to the show for that species. Animals will not be allowed to show if check-in is not completed.
9. Death of any livestock (market or other) will not be the responsibility of the Fair Board or Junior Market Livestock Sale Committee, but rather that of the bon-a-fide owner or the purchaser at the time of sale.

10. Open classes are open to ALL exhibitors. The class may be eliminated if the entries are a duplication of a prior Junior (4-H/FFA) class.
11. Market livestock may be shown in an open class but are not eligible for sale in the Junior Market Livestock Sale.
12. **LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS WILL BE REQUIRED TO STORE THEIR EXTRA FEED/TACK/SUPPLIES IN A DESIGNATED AREA SPECIFIED BY THE SPECIES SUPERINTENDENT.** Each 4-H Club or FFA Chapter will be allowed ONE (1) stock trailer to be parked in the exhibitor parking lot northwest of the livestock building for small animals (hogs/sheep/goats) and ONE stock trailer per club for beef exhibitors south of the beef barn. Designated space may also be provided for storage in the old beef barn on the north end of the livestock building. At no time shall tack or feed be stored in the fire lane.
13. All animals entered in breeding classes cannot compete in market or feeder classes. If an exhibitor is enrolled in a breeding project for a given species, they may exhibit intact females in the 4-H/FFA breeding show for that species, even if they have weighed the animal in as a potential market animal. The animal **CANNOT** be exhibited as a market animal during the fair and must be pre-entered as a breeding animal.
14. To eradicate Scrapie in the United States, the USDA requires sheep and goats to have Flock Identification ear tags that list their flock of origin.
15. The species superintendent(s) shall have the authority to divide their division into classes as needed. Market livestock classes will be broken by weight.
16. If a division contains 5 or fewer animals, Champion and Reserve Champion awards will be given at the discretion of the species superintendent.
17. **It is the Delta County Fair Board's desire, interest and responsibility to minimize animal health issues as much as possible before, during and after the fair, the board has instituted regulations. These requirements are by no means meant to be restrictive to participants but rather, they are hopefully and ultimately protective and beneficial to all by lessening the chances of exposure and spread of disease, particularly those that are not clinically apparent. It's common knowledge that the spread of disease is increased significantly when comingling at a venue such as a fair.**
18. Diseased or injured animals may be removed from the grounds upon recommendation of the attending species superintendent(s), the general livestock superintendent, or an attending veterinarian. A release must be signed by the species superintendent. Removal of animals from the fairgrounds prior to release time will result in loss of premiums. Animals deemed unworthy for competition by the species superintendent(s) may be barred from competition and removed from the fairgrounds.
19. The Fair Board will follow the current Colorado State Veterinary recommendations regarding health risks, quarantines, vet checks and cancellation of shows for potential livestock health threats and communicable diseases.
20. All animals must have their blankets removed prior to going through the vet inspection station. That means all blankets must be off when the Vet approaches the trailer. At the Veterinarian's discretion animals must be unloaded. Be prepared to unload your animal/animals at the request of the Vet.
21. Testing for illicit and illegal drugs will be at the discretion of the Fair Board with the samples collected and methodology of testing to be determined by the Fair Board.
22. Any state or federal regulations that might arise at time that would make them relevant to any fair activities will take precedent over Delta County Fair regulations.

## SECTION 6 – 4-H/FFA (JUNIOR) DIVISION RULES/REGULATIONS

1. This Department is open only to regularly enrolled 4-H Club members and FFA members in Delta County.
  - a. 4-H exhibitors must be at least age 8 and must not have reached their 19<sup>th</sup> birthday prior to January 1 of the current year and must satisfy other eligibility requirements for a class to complete in that class. **Juniors are ages 8-10, Intermediates are 11-13, and Seniors are ages 14 and up as of December 31, 2024.**
  - b. FFA exhibitors must be enrolled in a local Delta County FFA Chapter and may show market animals but must NOT have reached their 19<sup>th</sup> birthday prior to January 1 of the current year. FFA members may show breeding animals up to their 22<sup>nd</sup> birthday, as of January 1.
  - c. To be eligible to exhibit in the Delta County Fair, the exhibitor must be enrolled in or graduated from the Delta County School District and/or must be a resident of and residing in Delta County for the duration of the 4-H/FFA project. School enrollment is defined as where the student is counted for state enrollment.
2. Each 4-H member must be enrolled in his/her projects by May 1<sup>st</sup> preceding the county fair except for those livestock projects which have different assigned enrollment deadlines.
3. Check-in and interview judging of 4-H general projects will be on **Friday, July 25<sup>th</sup>, 2025.**
4. Exhibits in the 4-H/FFA division are subject to rule and regulation changes made by the State 4-H Office and the Colorado State Fair.
5. The Dress Code is in effect at any time the 4-H or FFA member and his/her animal are on display, including in the show ring, during sale pictures, during the Junior Market Livestock Sale, and when participating in the Fair Parade. This rule also applies to any helpers entering arenas or during the parade.
  - a. All 4-H and FFA members must dress to show respect to the organization. While exhibiting their livestock projects, 4-H and FFA members must wear a button up or snap shirt or blouse that is long enough to stay tucked in during ALL movements. Shirts must be buttoned or snapped all the way from the top to the bottom except for the collar. Collared polo shirts are acceptable with the above restrictions.
  - b. No shorts, t-shirts, sleeveless tops, excessively baggy pants or any clothing that exposes undergarments are allowed at any time while the 4-H or FFA member is exhibiting his/her animal.
  - c. Appropriate closed-toed shoes must be worn in the showring.
  - d. No hats or caps are allowed in the show ring or sale ring except for at the Horse Show.
6. The animal's owner (4-H/FFA member) should prepare their project animal when it is being exhibited at the Delta County Fair. Assistance may be provided by other Delta County 4-H or FFA members, parents, guardians, qualified persons, 4-H leaders and FFA advisors. It is recommended that another Colorado 4-H or FFA member be the first choice for assistance for a junior member. If assistance is provided, the Delta County 4-H or FFA member enrolled in the project must be present to benefit from teaching and instruction. Violation will result in the exhibitor being prohibited from showing that animal.
7. **BARN CURFEW RULES: For security reasons, all livestock barns will close at 10pm. Barns will remain closed until 6am. Security will be making rounds throughout the**

**night. No one, except security personnel, is allowed in the barn while it is closed. All animals must be properly secured when leaving for the night. Violation of this rule may result in disqualification from the species show and/or sale.**

8. All 4-H/FFA market animal exhibitors and parents or guardians will be required to sign a Certification and Statement of Disclosure (USDA Wholesome Meat Act Form) for each animal sold. **Forms are due one (1) hour after the conclusion of the show. Exhibitors will not be allowed to sell until the completed form(s) are turned in.**
9. The Delta County Fair enforces and supports the USDA Wholesome Meat Act and insists that exhibitors comply. Exhibitors of all market animal entries must certify their compliance with manufacturer's withdrawal period specified for all medications, drugs and pesticides or feed additives administered. The use of any non-approved chemical or improper use of approved chemicals is strictly prohibited.
10. The Delta County Fair reserves the right to screen or test any animal for drug residues of any nature and take any action deemed appropriate if testing results show any positive residues exceeding FDA/EPA/USDA established tolerances for any foreign substance including medications, drugs, pesticides, feed additives or chemicals. The Delta County Fair Board reserves the right to pass all fees required for testing on to the exhibitor.
11. **All livestock exhibitors must have completed a Meat Quality Assurance (MQA) training as required. MQA certification is required for new exhibitors and for exhibitors moving into the Senior age level.**
12. All 4-H and FFA animals must be cared for, shown, and sold by the owner. In case of emergency, another Delta County 4-H or FFA member may care for, show, or sell the animal with the approval of the General Livestock Superintendent and the Fair Board. **Under no circumstances may an adult assist or show an animal exhibited in the junior division.**

## **SECTION 6.01 DELTA COUNTY FAIR BRED & FED (DCFB&F)**

1. The animal being shown MUST have been born in Delta County.
2. The term BORN meaning that it is born and raised in Delta County. Delta County is defined as all of Delta County, including the areas of Maher, Somerset, Pea Green and Peach Valley, that are eligible to participate in DCF.
3. Artificial insemination (A.I.) and embryo transfer (E.T.) are recognized as methods of herd improvement. Animals bred by these methods are eligible for the DCB&F show.
4. All DCB&F beef must be branded with a Delta County Brand registered in Delta County.
5. All DCB&F sheep and goats must be tagged with a scrapie tag registered to a Delta County premises ID
6. All DCB&F swine must be ear notched by the Delta County producer.
7. All awards will be given by the Fair Board and will be consistent across all shows.
8. For every large animal species, the Grand and Reserve Champion DCB&F animals will be selected from the Champion drive/class. If the Grand Champion animal is born and raised in Delta County, then it will also be the Champion DCB&F animal. If the Reserve Grand Champion animal is born & raised in Delta County, then it will be the Reserve DCB&F animal. If the Grand Champion Market animal is not born and raised in Delta County but the Reserve Grand Champion animal is born and raised in Delta County, then the Reserve Grand Champion animal will be the Champion DCB&F animal and the Reserve DCB&F animal will be selected out of the remaining animals in the champion class/drive. If the

Reserve Champion animal is also not born and raised in Delta County, then the remaining DCB&F Champion/Reserve Champion will be selected from the remaining animals in the Champion drive. If there are not two born and raised in Delta County animals in the Champion class/drive, additional born and raised in Delta County animals, placing no lower than 4<sup>th</sup> place, may be pulled up at the discretion of the show superintendent to compete for the remaining award(s).

9. Animals will be designated as DCB&F on the show and sale bills with the simple notation of BF.
10. There will be a Youth Producer Breeding & Market Live Evaluation class following the usual 4-H/FFA Market and Breeding classes during fair for beef, sheep, swine and goats. Exhibitors are eligible to enter this class if they have registered as a Youth Producer through Delta County Bred & Fed, Inc. Requirements and details regarding entry in this program can be found at [www.deltacountybred&fed.com](http://www.deltacountybred&fed.com). Animals will be scored on breeding potential &/or market readiness, respectively. This score will be combined with herdsmanhip and interview scores for overall Youth Producer Awards. No individual awards will be given in this class.
11. Exhibitors who have registered for the Youth Producers Program must designate this on the Delta County Fair Pre-entry Form to participate in this class.

## **SECTION 6.02 MARKET LIVESTOCK NOMINATIONS**

1. Market animals to be exhibited in the Delta County Fair must be identified by an official Delta County Fair ear tag. Tags can be picked up at the Delta County Fairgrounds or the Extension Office as designated for the species on the advertised date for each species. Exhibitors will have the option to bring their sheep, goats and/or beef to the fairgrounds at this time and have a member of the fair board help them tag their animal(s). The livestock scales will be open at that time and members may opt to weigh their animals, but it will not be required. 4-H Exhibitors will be required to nominate all animals online at 4honline by set dates, which will be one week after weigh-in/tag-in/tag distribution. See specific animal species division rules for details. FFA members must turn in the listed paperwork to the 4-H Extension Office by the set registration deadlines.
2. Exhibitors will be charged a \$7.00 fee per head on all market livestock when tags are handed out. Any unused tags returned to the extension office will be issued a refund.
3. **If an exhibitor, or their designee, does not have their animal(s) tagged, upload required documentation, and pay required fees they shall not be allowed to exhibit such animal(s) at the upcoming fair.**
4. ALL MALE ANIMALS MUST BE CASTRATED OR BANDED BY REGISTRATION DEADLINE DATES. BANDED TESTICLES MUST HAVE FALLEN OFF OR BEEN REMOVED PRIOR TO SHOW WEIGH-IN. Any animal found to be out of compliance will not be allowed to show at the fair.
5. Initial tagging of all market beef, goats, sheep & swine is mandatory. All beef, sheep, goats and swine must be tagged in the photos required for online nominations by the date(s) set and advertised by the CSU Extension office. Any tag numbers that are checked out, but not assigned to an animal by the registration deadline will be invalidated.
6. Original Brand inspection certificates on all market beef must be uploaded at 4honline by the registration deadline and presented to the Brand Inspector at the time of final fair weigh-in.  
**ANIMAL WILL NOT BE WEIGHED IN AT FAIR WEIGH-IN UNLESS THE BRAND CERTIFICATE IS IN HAND WHEN COMING TO THE SCALES.**

7. At initial online registration, there will be no limit on the number of animals registered. However, because of space limitations, only 2 market animals per exhibitor for goats, sheep, swine, and beef can be brought and exhibited at Fair. Intact female animals initially weighed and tagged as market animals but not pre-entered in the market show can be shown in breeding classes if the exhibitor has enrolled in a breeding project for that species.
8. **FAMILY ANIMAL NOMINATIONS:** Family Nominations of Jr. Market Livestock will be accepted. At the time of nominations, all exhibitors may “family nominate” all animals according to the following guidelines:
  - a. The exhibitors must legally reside in the same household and are siblings, step siblings, or legally adopted.
  - b. The exhibitors must all permanently reside in the same county.
  - c. The livestock must be in continuous care of the exhibitors residing at the same residence.
  - d. Livestock must not be sold or transferred out of the exhibitor’s custody at any time after the nomination process is complete.
  - e. Animals must be designated as a “Family Nomination” at the initial online registration for that species.
  - f. Individual who will be showing the family nominated animal MUST be declared at the time of Pre-Entry. An animal can only be entered by one exhibitor, or the entry is considered invalid, and that animal is not eligible to show.
9. **Entry Procedure**
  - a. The Delta County Fair Pre-Entry Deadline is June 20<sup>th</sup>, 2025. All market beef, sheep, goats and swine pre-entered must have been registered online and tagged by the initial nomination deadline.
  - b. Siblings may nominate the same animal but may not Pre-Enter the same animal. At the time of Pre-Entry, the final exhibitor decision must be made, animals found double entered, (one animal entered in multiple exhibitors’ name), will be considered an invalid entry.
  - c. The exhibitor entering the animal must have cared for daily from the time of initial nomination.
  - d. Animals tagged-in or nominated, but not officially entered will not be eligible to show.
10. **FAIR WEIGH-IN:** Market livestock will be unloaded and weighed in as defined on the Official 2025 Delta County Fair Schedule.
11. **THE FAIR WEIGHT IS THE FINAL WEIGHT.** Any questions as to accuracy of a weigh-in weight must be made at the time the animal is on the scale. There will be no re-weighs.
12. The 4-H leader or FFA instructor must certify as to the ownership and project enrollment of the exhibitor. No partnership entries will be accepted. No one exhibit can be entered as both a 4-H and FFA project. An animal must be shown in the project in which the member is enrolled. No one animal may be shown in both market and breeding classes. No animal can be shown in more than one county.

## **SECTION 6.03 – MINIMUM MARKET LIVESTOCK WEIGHTS AT FAIR**

1. **Market steers** must weigh at least 1050 pounds. Market heifers must weigh at least 950 pounds.
2. **Miniature cattle breeds** will show in the Junior Market Beef Show. Exhibitors must declare miniature market steers/heifers as such during initial tag-in in February. Animals must weigh a

minimum of 600 pounds and a maximum of 1,000 pounds to compete in the Mini Market Beef Show.

3. **Market Sheep** must weigh 100 pounds with no upper weight limit.
4. **Market Swine** must weigh between 230 and 300 pounds.
5. **Market Goats** must weigh 60 pounds with no upper weight limit.
6. Beef, sheep, swine, and goats failing to meet the above weight requirements **will not be allowed to sell**. If an exhibitor's ONLY animal is under or overweight, the exhibitor will be allowed to show that animal in the showmanship class and/or feeder/heavy weight classes only.

## **SECTION 6.04 – ANIMAL AGES**

1. No steers or heifers shall be eligible to show if they have more than two center permanent incisors. All lambs and goats exhibited must be carrying milk teeth. A person designated by the Fair Board will determine age if in question.

## **SECTION 6.05 – FEED AND WATER**

1. No animal entered or exhibited at the Delta County Fair shall be deprived of water for any period as this may be detrimental to the health and well-being of the animal. Fresh, potable water will be regularly provided to all entered or exhibited animals within their stall or pen area. Any apparent violation of this rule should be called to the attention of the species or general livestock superintendent.
2. Arrangements for feeding, watering and care of livestock will be made by the exhibitor. For safety (fire) reasons, straw will not be allowed except for dairy cattle. Exhibitors are responsible for caring for all stock up to the time of load out.
3. All market animals administered feed additives and/or growth stimulants must be removed from such additive and/or stimulants within the withdraw time specified on the label.

## **SECTION 6.06 – PENS AND STALLS**

1. All pens, stalls and feeding areas must be cleaned daily by no later than 8:00 am and all refuse disposed in compliance with the direction of the Fair Board.
2. If there is an issue with an exhibitor's pen or stall, the species or general livestock superintendent will flag it with a laminated card. An exhibitor who receives a laminated card on their pen/stall must contact a superintendent to have the issue resolved. Issues must be resolved in order for the exhibitor to be allowed to continue to show/sell the animal.

## **SECTION 6.07 – ETHICS**

1. **UNETHICALLY FITTED LIVESTOCK** – the following are deemed unethical practices:
  - a. Doctoring, doping, tubing, or injecting oils, glycerin, or like substances for body “fill-ins” or alteration; changing/defacing or any modification of marking of a show animal or the anatomical structure of an animal; external applications of liniments and blistering agents that would cause edematous condition.
  - b. The removal, alteration, changing of or purposely damaging ear tags.

- c. The use of ice packs or other refrigerants to alter the quality of the finish of an animal. Icing animals will not be allowed. Wet towels only will be acceptable. Towels immersed in ice water will not be allowed.
- d. Drenching will be allowed with drench guns, but the use of stomach pumps is prohibited.
- e. **NO ARTIFICIAL DECORATIONS, lettering, paint, or glitter, etc., of any type will be permitted on any animal entering the sale or show ring.**
- f. Violations of these rules will result in disqualification with no recourse and be subject to other sanctions.
- g. **The natural body color of an animal cannot be altered using any artificial coloring.** Products that match the animal's natural color may be used in the fitting process for the knees and hocks down and on the switch only. For example: black products may be used on a black-legged animal, but under no circumstances can color be used to cover an animal's natural leg color. No altering structure of hair or wool coat, except trimming and blocking, will be allowed.
- h. Any entry adding an artificial tail head or tail fin, artificial poll, or addition any hair or hair-like substance will be disqualified.

2. The showing of livestock of any ineligible age or showing unethically fitted livestock is prohibited.

3. Any exhibitor, parent, 4-H leader, superintendent, FFA Advisor, or Extension Agent or staff found to have committed any of the above listed unethical practices, or any other practice deemed unethical by the Fair Board, will be subject to the following possible consequences:

- a. Forfeiture of all premium monies.
- b. Disqualification from the Junior Market Livestock Sale of the current year of the show
- c. Probation for one (1) year
- d. Barred for three (3) years
- e. Barred for life or punishment designated by the Fair Board.

4. Failure to comply with these rules will be considered a clear violation of the ethical standards established by the Delta County Fair Board. All complaints concerning entries or judging of entries shall be made following the "grievance" procedures in writing, dated and signed by the complainant, and presented to the superintendent of that department by noon following the judging of the project in question. These complaints, so presented, will be considered by the Fair Board or by representatives designated by the Fair Board.

## SECTION 6.08 – SHOWMANSHIP CLASSES

- 1. Exhibitors entered in showmanship classes must show their own animals.
- 2. Exhibitors entering showmanship must also exhibit a breeding or market animal in the species they entered showmanship in. Horse showman must also enter at least one additional class.
- 3. Showmanship classes will be divided into three exhibitor age groups in all species:
  - a. Juniors – ages 8, 9 and 10 years old as of December 31<sup>st</sup> of the current year
  - b. Intermediates – ages 11, 12 and 13 years old as of December 31<sup>st</sup> of the current year
  - c. Seniors – ages 14 years old and older as of December 31<sup>st</sup> of the current year
- 4. First place show persons in senior, intermediate and junior classes of beef, sheep, swine, goats, dairy and horse are automatically entered in the Round Robin Contest. **Out of fairness**

**to other showman, exhibitors entering showmanship must be willing to participate in the Round Robin contest if they win showmanship for that species. Scratches from Round Robin will only be accepted in the event of an emergency or if the exhibitor has qualified for Round Robin with another species. In this case, the second-place showman of the scratched species will be expected to show. If an exhibitor chooses not to participate in Round Robin after winning showmanship, their project will not be considered completed.**

5. Ribbons will be given to the first five placings in each age group.
6. **The highest overall scoring contestant of the Round Robin contest will be eligible to participate in the Master Showmanship class at the Colorado State Fair.**

## **SECTION 6.09 – MARKET CLASSES**

1. In market classes, the superintendent(s) will determine the class divisions and the number of animals in each class after the animals are weighed. The superintendent's decision on classification will be final.

## **SECTION 6.10 – BREEDING CLASSES**

1. The animal(s) in all breeding classes must have been owned by the exhibitor before May 1 of the current year to be eligible to show.
2. Breeding animals will show in their class according to age of the animal.

## **SECTION 6.11 – CHAMPION CLASSES**

1. All animals which have been awarded First Place will be permitted to compete for Grand Champion. After the selection of the Grand Champion, the remaining first place winners and the second-place winner in the Grand Champion's class will compete for Reserve Grand Champion.
2. If the Grand Champion and/or Reserve Grand Champion beef, sheep, swine or goat are entered as Delta County Bred & Fed, they are automatically the Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion Delta County Bred & Fed in that species (see Delta County Bred & Fed Rules).

## **SECTION 6.12 JUNIOR MARKET LIVESTOCK SALE**

1. The Delta County Junior Market Livestock Sale Committee requires every 4-H and FFA member who exhibits a market livestock project to invite two businesses or individuals to attend the Junior Market Livestock Sale. These invitations must be documented on the specified form and returned to the Delta Extension Office with the fair Pre-Entry forms no later than 4:30 PM on June 20, 2025. Additionally, the Livestock Sale Committee may also require that the exhibitor deliver sale information and invitation(s) to designated businesses. These businesses may be used to fill out the form mentioned above. Failure on the part of the 4-H/FFA member to return this form by the deadline will result in the Sale Committee collecting \$25 per invitation not contacted (up to \$50) from the 4-H/FFA member's sale check. These forms are available online and at the CSU Extension Office.
2. All animals NOT being sold in the Junior Market Livestock Sale may be removed from the barns on the Friday night of fair after 7 pm.

- 3. EVERY ANIMAL THAT IS SOLD AT THE JUNIOR MARKET LIVESTOCK SALE IS HENCEFORTH OWNED BY THE BUYER. The buyer may opt to have the animal processed, put on the buy-back list, take the animal home or give the animal back to the exhibitor. Any further sales or transactions involving the animal must occur off the fairgrounds after completion of the fair. No animal sold at the Delta County Livestock Sale can be exhibited again at ANY OTHER SHOW IN THE FUTURE. Any exhibitor found to be in breach of this rule will not be allowed to show livestock at the Delta County Fair in the following year.**
4. A list of all animals sold at the Delta County Junior Market Livestock Sale will be provided to the Colorado State Fair Livestock Office, so that the state fair livestock committee will know which will not be participating in the Colorado State Fair.
5. The buyers of all livestock at the Junior Market Livestock Sale shall designate the destination of every animal they purchase in the sale prior to leaving the fairgrounds. The animal can be put on buyback, sent to a specific processing plant, taken home by the buyer, or sent home with the exhibitor. The Junior Market Livestock Sale Committee will arrange transportation to the prearranged processing plants.
6. The Junior Market Livestock Sale Committee and the Delta County Fair Board act only as agents for the Junior Market Livestock Sale. Death of any livestock will not be the responsibility of the Fair Board or Junior Market Livestock Sale Committee but rather that of the purchaser at the time of sale or other bon-a-fide owner.
7. All exhibitors will be considered as consigners to the sale unless he/she notifies the livestock office within one hour after completion of show that he/she does not desire to sell. If the exhibitor has two animals of one species, the individual must designate which animal he/she intends to sell within one hour after the show is over. If the individual has not designated which qualified animal they intend to sell within that time frame, the Sale Committee will pick the highest placing animal shown by the individual for the sale. **Please see rule 11 below for exceptions to the one animal rule.**
8. Once a market animal is identified as going through the Junior Market Livestock Sale, another animal may NOT be substituted.
9. If an animal is pulled from the sale after the sale order has been submitted to the printer, the member will not be able to show/sell any market species the following year.
10. **THE NUMBER OF LOTS IN THE JUNIOR MARKET LIVESTOCK SALE WILL BE AT THE DISCRETION OF THE FAIR BOARD.**
11. Each 4-H/FFA exhibitor with animals that qualify for the Junior Market Livestock Sale can sell a maximum of one (1) animal, **unless the exhibitor has won Grand or Reserve Grand Champion in the market rabbit or poultry divisions. Champions of these divisions will be allowed to sell one (1) large animal as well if they qualify for the sale with that animal.** This second animal must be designated for the sale per the usual designation process. The following process will be followed for designation of sale animals:

  - a. If an exhibitor only has one (1) qualifying market animal, they will automatically be allowed to sell.
  - b. If an exhibitor has two (2) market animals eligible for the sale, the exhibitor's highest placing animal will be automatically added to the sale.
  - c. If an exhibitor wishes to have their lower placing animal in the sale, their highest placing animal will be removed and not be eligible for the sale.
  - d. Grand or Reserve Grand Market Show Champions must sell, and exhibitors cannot designate a lower placed animal in its place.
12. All Grand and Reserve Grand Champions of each market division are required to sell and will be sold first, followed by the Champion and Reserve Champion Delta County Bred & Fed animals –

if the animal is not one and the same. This includes Champion and Reserve Champion Bred & Fed animals, market sheep, swine, beef, mini beef, goats, chickens, ducks, turkeys, and rabbits.

13. Sale order will be determined by the class placing and weight of the qualified animals in the market classes. Delta County Bred & Fed entries in all species will be identified as such in the Market Livestock Sale program with the letters "BF."
14. Buy Back – Animals will be allowed to be sold through the buy-back program as space is available in the following order:
  - a. Animals going through the sale that buyers purchased and requested to go on buy-back.
  - b. Any entered animal at the Delta County Fair in the Junior Market Livestock Program. Information MUST be to the office by Noon on Friday to be eligible for buy-back placement.
  - c. If the buy-back buyer cannot accommodate additional animals that did not go through the sale, exhibitors requesting a buy-back position will be notified and it will be their responsibility to arrange for the ultimate disposition of their animal(s).
15. A 4-H/FFA livestock exhibitor that sells any species of market livestock in any other county fair (4-H/FFA livestock division) during the same calendar year, IS NOT ELIGIBLE to sell or exhibit in the 4-H/FFA livestock division of the Delta County Fair.
16. A 5% consignment fee will be charged on all livestock sold through the sale and on all add-on monies. This charge will be used to defray expenses, pay for the cost of publishing a "thank you" advertisement to the buyers, cover expenses to allow the Livestock Sale Committee to host events to promote the Junior Market Livestock Sale, and cover the cost of weighing and tagging programs held prior to the Fair.
17. **If a person desires to donate "add-on" money to an exhibitor, the add on form must be filled out online and money paid prior to the beginning of the Junior Market Livestock Sale.**
18. An exhibitor will not be allowed to sell his/her animal if he/she has not had their photo taken with their designated sale animal in front of the Delta County Fair backdrop during the designated times for photos or if he/she is not on hand to line up with their animal for the Sale.
19. All animals become the property of the buyer at the point of sale but must be cared for by the exhibitor until released from the fairgrounds.
20. The Delta County Fair Board and Junior Market Sale Committee are not liable for any breaches of contract(s) between the seller and buyer because of condemnation or any other matter.
21. If any animal is condemned to slaughter for any reason, whether by testing results or by USDA inspector condemnation, the Delta County Fair Board and the Junior Market Livestock Sale Committee may withhold any payment to the exhibitor and return it to the purchaser.
22. The Junior Market Livestock Sale Committee requires both 4-H and FFA members who sell their animals at the Delta County Fair to WRITE A THANK YOU to their buyer(s) to receive payment for their animals. Members are required to write a thank you, put it in an addressed and stamped envelope, and bring it to the Extension Office or other designated drop off location(s). Livestock sale check(s) will not be available to anyone until 2 weeks after the Delta County Fair.
23. If a thank you is not turned in, the member will not be allowed to show/sell any market species the following year.
24. If a 4-H or FFA member who sells animal(s) at the Delta County Fair does not cash their check within the validation period, or if they lose their check, a \$50 fee will be charged upon reissuance of the check.

## **SECTION 6.13 – HERDSMAN AWARD**

1. The Delta County Fair Board will present individual Herdsman Awards. These awards will be presented to the individual or club/chapter of each species that have shown the best management, care, grooming, and cleanliness of all areas during the fair.

## **SECTION 6.14 – ANIMAL LOAD-OUT**

1. Exhibitors are responsible for caring for sale stock up to load out time.
2. All animals NOT being sold in the Junior Market Livestock Sale may be removed from the barns on the Friday night of fair between 7 pm.
3. All beef must be in the barn for load out by 7:00 AM on the final Sunday morning of the Fair.
4. Buy-back animals may load out Saturday night if determined by the Junior Market Livestock Sale Committee.
5. **No exhibitors will be allowed in the barn on Sunday until all animals being loaded for buy-back and/or processors have been loaded out. However, they should be on-hand and ready to clean the barn immediately once the barn is opened by the superintendent(s).**
6. **IN ORDER TO REMAIN A MEMBER IN GOOD STANDING FOR THE FOLLOWING YEAR, ALL PENS MUST BE CLEANED BY NOON.**

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## **LIVESTOCK PREMIER EXHIBITOR PROGRAM**

### **PREMIER EXHIBITOR RULES:**

The Delta County Fair Board will offer a LIVESTOCK PREMIER EXHIBITOR AWARD to 4-H and FFA members enrolled in the Beef, Swine, Goat, Sheep, Rabbit, and/or Poultry projects. (Horse and Shooting Sports Premier Exhibitor rules discussed in their respective categories. The purpose of this award is to recognize members who exemplify the educational goals of these programs.

#### **Rules & Regulations:**

1. Evaluation criteria and scoring system will be based on categories specific to these projects, as described in the 2025 Premier Exhibitor Syllabus, which is available at [www.deltacountyfair.com](http://www.deltacountyfair.com)
2. If, at the June pre-entry deadline, a minimum of 5 exhibitors have not signed up for the Premier Exhibitor program in a given species/project, the program for that species/project will be cancelled that year.
3. No parent of any 4-H/FFA exhibitor, including Delta County Fair Board members, will have any involvement in the selection of a judge in the Premier Exhibitor Program.
4. Any participant in the Premier Exhibitor Program who does not participate in ANY portion of said program will lose 50% of their total score.
5. An appointed committee of Fair Board members will determine the overall winner for each division by reviewing total points on Friday prior to the Round Robin Showmanship Contest. Awards will be presented at the conclusion of the Round Robin contest.

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### **PEE WEE SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST**

The Pee Wee Showmanship contest is open to all youth up to age 7. All animals exhibited (bucket calves, bottle lambs, goat kids, and feeder pigs) must be born in 2023. Lambs, calves and goat kids must be halter broke. All animals must be checked in at the Livestock Office no later than 2:00 pm on the day of the show. Refer to the 4-H/FFA livestock pre-entry forms for class numbers and deadline date.

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### **ROUND ROBIN SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST**

First place show persons in senior, intermediate and junior classes of beef, sheep, swine, goats, dairy and horse are automatically entered in the Round Robin Contest. **Out of fairness to other showman, exhibitors entering showmanship must be willing to participate in the Round Robin contest if they win showmanship for that species. Scratches from Round Robin will only be accepted in the event of an emergency or if the exhibitor has qualified for Round Robin with another species. In this case, the second-place showman of the scratched species will be expected to show. If an exhibitor chooses not to participate in Round Robin after winning showmanship, their project will not be considered completed.**

During the contest, each exhibitor will have four (4) minutes per species to demonstrate their showmanship skills. Show person(s) will rotate through all six species of livestock, finishing with their own animal. Exhibitors will show in their respective age divisions. Exhibitors must use the same animal which he/she won the species showmanship class with. Fitting score will be included in the total score and will be used as a tie breaker.

## **OPEN CLASS & 4-H/FFA MARKET & BREEDING BEEF SHOW**

### **Department 4**

#### **BEEF RULES AND REGULATIONS:**

1. Animals entered in breeding classes cannot compete in market or feeder classes.
2. Producing cows are not eligible to be shown without calf and are not eligible for champion heifer classes. Producing cows with calf at side are eligible for the Champion Cow-Calf Pair classes.
3. **Cross breeds=any cross in cattle involving crossing of breeds.**
4. No water containers can be left unattended with the animal(s) in the barn.
5. Feeding in the barn is allowed, however the area must be always kept clean.
6. All beef animals will be always tied with a halter and neck rope.
7. All breeding females will be separated by age classification and judges accordingly.
8. Stall size per head will be no more than 4 feet in width.
9. Yearling bulls and older must be handled with either a nose lead or permanent ring in addition to a regular halter.
10. Age classifications for the Beef Show shall be:

Junior Heifer Classes - Calved on or after January 2025

Senior Heifer Classes – Calved August 2024 to Dec 2024

Summer Yearling Heifers Calved May to August 2024

Spring Yearling Heifers Calved March to April 2024

Junior Yearling Heifers Calved January to Feb. 2023

Senior Yearling Heifers Calved September to Feb 2022

Producing Cow, Calf by Side

Junior Bull Calves – Calved on or after January 2025

Senior Bull Calves – Calved August 2024 to Dec 2024

Yearling Bulls – Calved January 2024 to July 2024

Junior Steer Calves – Calved on or after January 2025

Senior Steer Calves – Calved August 2024 to Dec 2024

#### **JUNIOR (4-H/FFA) DIVISION SPECIFIC RULES:**

1. Market Beef must be nominated in the following manner:

- Beef tag check out and optional tag-in will take place on February 8<sup>th</sup> from 1:00-3:00pm at the Delta County Fairgrounds in Hotchkiss. Scales will be open, but weighing of animals is optional.
- NO TAGS WILL BE HANDED OUT AFTER THIS DATE. If you fail to pick up tags AND/OR attend the weigh-in/tag-in, at the county fairgrounds you will not be allowed to enter the 2025 Delta County Fair.
- All market animal exhibitors will be required to upload information in 4-HOnline. FOR BEEF THIS INFORMATION IS DUE BY 4:30 PM ON FEBRUARY 14, 2025.
- Two pictures of each animal must be uploaded at the time of nomination: one profile view and one front view clearly showing the Delta County Fair tag in the right ear, unless the right ear is untaggable. The exhibitor(s) must be present in at least one photo.

- Any incomplete nominations will not be accepted and will not be allowed to show at the 2025 Delta County Fair. (This includes missing brand inspections and pictures not clearly showing the DCF ear tag as well as the animal).
- NO taggers will be available for individual use, members without tagging equipment should attend weigh-in /tag-in dates provided by the fair board. The tags that will be provided are Y-TEX brand and require Y-TEX taggers to be used when placing them on the animal(s).

2. All Market Beef will be required to be in the tie-outs, breeding animals may stay in the barn or be tied in the designated tie-out. Cow- calf pairs will be kept in designated pens. No Personal panels or pens will be permitted.
3. **BARN CURFEW RULES:** For security reasons, all livestock barns will close at 10pm. Barns will remain closed until 6am. Security will be making rounds throughout the night. **No one**, except security personnel, is allowed in the barn while it is closed. All animals must be properly secured when leaving for the night. Violation of this rule may result in disqualification from the species show and/or sale.
4. **BREEDING BEEF SHOW** – Open to all 4-H/FFA and Breed Association Junior members. All registered, purebred and crossbred animals will be shown together in their respective age classes.

#### **JUNIOR DIVISION DELTA COUNTY BRED & FED MARKET RULES:**

5. Open to any market beef animal that was born & raised in Delta County by a Delta County producer.
6. All Delta County Bred & Fed Market Beef animals must be branded with a registered Delta County brand.
7. All Delta County Bred & Fed Market Beef animals must be designated as “Bred & Fed” at the time of initial animal online nomination. A signed “Affidavit of Bred & Fed Status” must be provided at initial online registration. Exhibitors are responsible for obtaining all required documentation. Delta County producers are no longer required to register as “Bred & Fed Producers” but will need to sign the “Affidavit of Bred & Fed Status”. If the “Affidavit of Bred & Fed Status” is found to be falsified in any way, the exhibitor will not be allowed to show in the Market Beef Show in the following year and, after investigation, if the producer was also involved in the falsification, no animals produced by that producer will be allowed to be considered as Bred & Fed for the following year.
8. There will be a Youth Producer Breeding & Market Live Evaluation class following the usual 4-H/FFA Market and Breeding classes during fair for beef, sheep, swine and goats. Exhibitors are eligible to enter this class if they have registered as a Youth Producer through Delta County Bred & Fed, Inc. Requirements and details regarding entry in this program can be found at [www.deltacountybred&fed.com](http://www.deltacountybred&fed.com). Animals will be scored on breeding potential &/or market readiness, respectively. This score will be combined with herdsmanhip and interview scores for overall Youth Producer Awards. No individual awards will be given in this class.
9. Exhibitors who have registered for the Youth Producers Program must designate this on the Delta County Fair Pre-Entry Form in order to participate in this class.

**MINIATURE BEEF BREED RULES:**

10. Height regulations (these measurements are maximums): Bulls – 48" hip height, Steers – 47" hip height, Cows/Heifers – 45" hip height. The measurement will be taken at fair weigh-in, in a standardized measurement system (set up the same, measured by the same person).

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## **4-H HORSE SHOW**

### **Department 8**

**Superintendent:** Jolene Medill, Eckert

#### **OFFICIAL DELTA COUNTY HORSE SHOW RULES AND REGULATIONS:**

1. In all classes where speed is the test, no premiums shall be awarded without competition.
2. 4-H members are responsible for knowing the specific rules of the show in which he/she is entered.
3. The latest edition of the Colorado 4-H Horse Show Rulebook will govern the horse show; or the AQHA Rule Book if a rule is not available in the 4-H Rule Book.
4. All ages are determined as of December 31, 2024.
5. The 4-H member should have complete access to the project horse(s) at any time and must provide care and management a majority of the time since May 1st of the current year, whether the horse is owned or leased. Horse identification certificates and lease agreements for 4-H members must be on file with the Extension Office by May 1 of the current year and a \$5.00 fee must be paid per horse. Maximum ID fee not to exceed \$20 per 4-H family.
6. Horses entered in any of the classes must be identified by May 1 and complete records must appear in the exhibitor's record book. The horse identification certificates must be the same as the record books. Members must present their record books to the Superintendent(s) for approval prior to receiving exhibitor packet.
7. If professional training is necessary, due to safety issues or a member using a green horse, the member must be involved 50% of the time while the horse is at the trainer. The total time at the trainers shall not exceed 20 days from June 1 until the Delta County Fair Horse Show.
8. A horse may only be shared by siblings and only shown by siblings if they show or are entered in different age divisions or classifications.
9. This is an all-breeds show and horses will be judged accordingly. Gaited horses will perform a comparable gait to the trot. They will be required to lope/canter with the exception of the Novice classes.
10. The Delta County Fair Horse Show written test will be held Thursday, July 24, 2025 at 7:00 P.M. at Heritage Hall. The Delta County Fair Horse Show consisting of written test, showmanship, halter, and Western and English classes will be held Saturday, July 26, 2025. The Working Ranch Horse and Gymkhana classes will be held Sunday, July 27, 2025.
11. All 4-H horse exhibitors must take the written test and compete in a showmanship class to be eligible to show in the performance classes, including Gymkhana, Working Ranch, English and Western divisions.
12. Levels Testing: Written and riding levels tests must be completed and passed by June 20, 2025. Use of approved Levels Rating Judges for the Riding Tests and the Extension Office should be notified of intent to test prior to actual testing. Members will take written levels tests at the Delta Extension Office.
13. The Novice division is limited to horse project members who have attempted, but not passed, Level 1 written and riding tests. Yearly attempts must be made to successfully pass the Level 1 tests. First year project members are encouraged, but not required, to attempt Level 1. All Novice classes will be walk-trot only.
14. You must request permission from show management to approach a judge to ask questions or to ask for critique. Under no circumstances may an exhibitor, parent, leader or spectator insult, badger or be argumentative with a judge, show secretary, ring steward or show management.

Any flagrant display of poor sportsmanship or affront to the judge or ring steward by, or on behalf of, an exhibitor may result in exclusion of the exhibitor from competition and forfeiture of awards or expulsion from the show grounds of the offending person and/or exhibitor.

15. No horse or pony may be shown in any class at the 4-H show if any forbidden substance has been administered in any form. A forbidden substance is any stimulant, depressant or local anesthetic which might affect the performance of a horse. Stimulants and depressants are defined as medications which stimulate or depress the circulatory, respiratory, or central nervous system. Also prohibited are any drugs, regardless of how harmless or innocuous they might be, which by their very nature, may mask or screen the presence of the aforementioned prohibited drugs or prevent or delay testing procedures. The use of these drugs is considered physical abuse and consequences will be enforced through the General Rules and Regulations. The full use of modern therapeutic measures including phenylbutazone for the improvement and protection of the health of a horse is permitted, unless the treatment may also stimulate or depress the circulatory, respiratory or central nervous systems. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to declare, in written form, any veterinarian's prescribed medication to show management prior to the start of the show.
16. Decision(s) of the judge is/are final. A judge may, at his/ her discretion, excuse and or penalize a horse for unsoundness and/or may excuse a rider whose mount is not under suitable control and/or is using unacceptable tack or equipment. Rules 1, 20 and 21 of the Colorado 4-H Horse Show Rule Book will be strictly enforced.
17. In order to participate in the Delta County Fair 4-H Horse Show a Primary Care Form must be filed with the Delta Extension Office by May 1 of the current year. It is the responsibility of every participating 4-H member to ensure that proper care is taken of their horse according to acceptable methods of good equine husbandry, as the for by CSU Extension and the Colorado Department of Agriculture. A healthy horse requires sufficient food, water, shelter and health care. Cruel and inhumane training methods are not appropriate in the Colorado 4-H Horse Program. Specific equine husbandry guidelines and humane training methods are provided in the Colorado 4-H Horse Project Manual.
18. Horses must be kept in the trailer, stall or arena area. Vehicles and trailers must be parked in designated areas.
19. No bareback riding, no double riding, no trotting, no loping, nor other unsafe gaits are allowed outside the specified areas.
20. Dress Code – see current 4-H Horse Show Rule Book.
21. The **Written Test** will be held at 7:00 P.M Thursday, July 24, 2025 in Heritage Hall. Horse Show exhibitor packets will be handed out at the completion of the written test. The written test is mandatory for all exhibiting 4-H horse project members.
22. **Showmanship Contest:** 4-H horse show participants must participate in this contest. Showmanship classes will be divided by age: Junior, Intermediate, and Senior. There will not be separate showmanship classes for English and Western therefore horses may be shown in either English or Western. The first-place winners in the Junior, Intermediate and Senior age divisions will be eligible for the Round Robin Contest. There will be a Novice Only Showmanship class that will be open to all ages, however this class is not eligible for the Round Robin contest. Qualifying exhibitors must fit and show the same horse in the Round Robin Contest that they won with in the Showmanship class.
23. At no time is anyone, except the youth or another 4-H member, allowed to ride or exercise a competing horse. Family members, leaders, trainers or other Delta County 4-H members may offer reasonable assistance to an exhibitor as long as the exhibitor is actively involved.
24. Tail extensions will be permitted.

25. A red ribbon must be tied to the tails of kicking horses.
26. Stallions one year of age and older are prohibited in 4-H and at the Delta County Fair.
27. **Protective Headgear Policy** – A certified equestrian helmet with safety harness fastened in place is required in over-the-fence classes and gymkhana events, activities and practice sessions (i.e. timed events not involving livestock). It is the responsibility of the parent and/or guardian of the 4-H member to see that the headgear worn complies with such standards and is in good condition. The Colorado State 4-H Office encourages the use of ASTM Certified/SEI Approved safety helmets in all equine events. Protective headgear may be used in all classes and shall not be discriminated against.
28. Patterns may not follow the 4-H Horse Show Rule Book. Superintendent(s) may provide alternate patterns for appropriate skill levels. A properly executed flying lead change will score higher than a properly executed simple lead change. A properly executed simple lead change may score higher than a poorly executed flying lead change.
29. To enter English Hunter Hack, the rider must have passed Level III Written and English Hunter Riding Test. The exhibitor's Delta County Fair pre-entry form must be signed and reflect their jump certification status. If the horse/rider cannot pass the jump certification, they may enter English Training Over Obstacles. Exhibitors may only enter Hunter Hack or Training Over Obstacles but not both classes.
30. Once a show order and the exhibitor number is called, the exhibitor MUST appear in this order in the time specified by show officials. When an exhibitor delays a class, the class will be closed at the order of the judge and/or horse show management. The announcer will make three (3) warning calls. Upon issuance of the third (last) call, the class will be closed.
31. No cross entering is allowed. Exhibitors entered in any Novice Classes may not enter any of the regular classes.
32. All points will be tabulated per the 4-H State Horse Rule Book.
33. If any class has only one (1) entry, it may be combined with same class in a higher age division, if all parties are agreeable.

#### **LEAD LINE CLASS RULES:**

34. Open to youth ages 3-7. Entries may be tacked in English or Western attire for a horse show. A helmet is required. A halter should be worn under the bridle. Please note that all lead line participants must be accompanied by an adult who is in control of the animal at all times. This means the adult has a lead line properly attached to the animal but is trying to maintain a passive role by letting the rider maintain control of the animal at the same time. Basically, the adult is there in case of emergency, should the rider need immediate assistance with his/her mount. A second adult may accompany the rider for safety.
  - a. Boots with a heel must be worn. No tennis shoes.
  - b. Judges may ask simple questions on the very basics of riding.
  - c. Handlers are not required to be in show attire but safe and respectable attire for a horse show. Coaching from handlers while entries are in the ring being judged is discouraged and entries will be marked accordingly.
35. Purpose – The exhibitor will display his/her ability to steer and show the mount in a class that is appropriate for their skill level. Exhibitors in this class may not show in any other class at the same show. Lead line is to be evaluated on the rider's position and active involvement in guiding the animal.
36. Class Procedure and Guidelines – The entire class shall be worked at a walk, both ways in the ring. At the judge's discretion, the class may be asked to back or trot. Show management should

communicate their expectations regarding gaits to the judge prior to the class entering the ring. The class is to enter the ring at a walk and proceed at the ringmaster's instruction.

#### **WITHOUT LEAD LINE CLASS RULES:**

37. The rules for the Lead Line Class will be followed except there will not be a handler with the lead line attached to the halter of the horse. An adult must still accompany the child at ALL time to quickly control the horse if needed.

### **HORSE SHOW AWARDS**

#### **High Point Awards/Division Awards**

Points are tallied by the number of participants in the class and not to exceed 6 points.

Examples:

- 2 entries in a class, 1<sup>st</sup> place receives 2 points and 2<sup>nd</sup> place receives 1 point.
- 8 entries in a class, 1<sup>st</sup> place receives 6 points, 2<sup>nd</sup> 5 points, 3<sup>rd</sup> 4 points, 4<sup>th</sup> 3 points, 5<sup>th</sup> 2 points, 6<sup>th</sup> 1 point. The remaining two contestants do not receive any points.

Classes included in the points calculation for the High Point Awards include: Written Test, Showmanship, English, Western, Ranch Horse and Gymkhana. To be eligible for high point awards, an exhibitor MUST show in at least TWO divisions. The exhibitor with the highest total points will be determined winner regardless of total number of classes entered. If a tie occurs for the high point awards in any division, the exhibitor placing highest in horsemanship or equitation will be declared the winner. If a tie remains, exhibitor placing highest in showmanship is declared the winner. If a tie remains, the exhibitor placing the highest in the written test class is declared the winner. Division awards will be calculated using the division classes. If a tie occurs, the tiebreaker will be the written test followed by showmanship.

#### **Sportsmanship Award**

\$20 awarded to the individual who shows outstanding leadership and best attitude during the two days of the show.

#### **Halter Champion**

This award acknowledges the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion halter classes for mares and geldings.

#### **Showmanship Champion**

The award acknowledges the first-place winner in each of the age divisions. There will be a Novice, Junior, Intermediate and Senior Showmanship Champion.

#### **POULTRY MAY NOT BE PENNED OVERNIGHT**

#### **POULTRY RULES AND REGULATIONS:**

1. The American Standard of Perfection shall govern.
2. Old birds should be the property of the exhibitor for at least 6 months. In all circumstances, birds must be the property of, and in the care of, no less than 6 weeks prior to the show.
3. Birds entered as singles will not be allowed to compete in pens and vice versa.
4. A trio consists of one male and two females.
5. Birds hatched prior to January 1 of current year shall be entered as "cock", "old tom", or "hen". Birds hatched during the year shall be entered as "cockerel", "young tom", or "pullet".
6. A turkey pair consists of a hen and old tom or a pullet and young tom.
7. **Turkeys** – Two birds, same sex, this year's hatch. The pair of turkeys must weigh a minimum of 35 pounds.
8. **Broiler/Fryer or Roaster** – Young birds, three of the same sex, up to 8 to 10 weeks of age. Fryers will weigh a minimum of 3 pounds up to a maximum of 6 pounds. Broilers will weigh a minimum of 6 pounds up to a maximum of 8 pounds. No bird in any pen shall weigh more than 8 pounds.
9. Classes will be judged by BREED GROUPS ONLY.
10. All poultry/waterfowl must be shown by exhibitors at the judge's stand on judging day.
11. **AMERICAN BREEDS:** Plymouth Rock, Dominique, Wyandotte, Java, Rhode Island Red, Rhode Island White, Buckeye, Chantecleer, Jersey Giant, New Hampshire, Laminas, Holland, and Delaware
12. **ASIATIC BREEDS:** Brahma, Cochin, Langshang
13. **ENGLISH BREEDS:** Dorking, Red Cap, Cornish, Orpington, Sussex, Austrakorp
14. **MEDITERRANEAN BREEDS:** Leghorn, Minorca, Spanish, Blue Andalusian, Ancona, Buttercup, Catalana
15. **HAMBURG BREEDS**
16. **CONTINENTAL BREEDS:** Campine, Lakenveder
17. **FRENCH BREEDS:** Houdan, Crevecouer, LaFleche, Faverolle

Security will be making rounds throughout the night. **No one**, except security personnel, is allowed in the barn while it is closed. All animals must be properly secured when leaving for the night. Violation of this rule may result in disqualification from the species show and/or sale.

#### **JUNIOR (4-H/FFA) DIVISION RULES:**

25. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion broiler (fryer) pens, Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion turkey meat pens, and Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion waterfowl pens MUST sell. Champions of this division will be allowed to sell one (1) large animal as well if they qualify for the sale with that animal.

26. Other placings will be allowed to sell if exhibit meets weight and eligibility requirements.

27. Market Duck Special Rules:

- a. Market Duck Meat Class – two birds, same sex, this year's hatch
- b. Market ducks should be between 7 and 12 weeks of age
- c. Market ducks should each weigh between 5 and 10 pounds
- d. Meat Type Ducks: Pekin, Muscovies, Rouen and Ayleburys

28. Market Geese Special Rules:

- a. Market Geese Meat Class – two birds, same sex, this year's hatch
- b. Market Geese should be between 7 and 12 weeks of age
- c. Market Geese must each weigh a minimum of 8 pounds
- d. Meat Type Geese: African, Embden, Toulouse

#### RABBIT RULES & REGULATIONS:

1. ARBA rules shall govern. Refer to the ARBA (American Rabbit Breeders Association) Standards of Perfection book.
2. Standard weights will be determined by ARBA guidelines. Market rabbits must have been the property of the exhibitor by July 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year.
3. Breeding rabbits must have been the property of, and in the possession of, the exhibitor since May 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year.
4. All rabbits must be shown in the class truest to breed, regardless of color, such as red, white, or black New Zealand.
5. Once they enter the fairgrounds, no rabbit may be exchanged for another.
6. No rabbit showing illness will be allowed at fair.
7. No rabbits are to be placed in cages until checked in by the superintendent.

8. Meat pens shall consist of three (3) rabbits, same breed and variety or of mixed breeding. Meat pen rabbits must be weighed when checked in to be eligible to be shown. **Minimum weight: 3.0 pounds each, maximum weight: 5.5 pounds each.**
9. Mixed breed rabbits may ONLY be shown in the meat pen class.
10. Fur classes will be for fur types: Specialty (Rex & Satin), Wool, or Regular Fur (all other breeds). Any rabbit entered in any fur class must be entered in his or her regular class first.
11. Cardboard for under rabbit cages is no longer supplied for exhibitors. Plan on bringing plenty of cardboard or newspaper to place under rabbit cages to last through a week of fair.
12. Rabbit classes are broken by animal age as follows:
  - a. Junior – under 6 months of age
  - b. Intermediate – 6 to 8 months of age
  - c. Senior – over 8 months of age
13. **BARN CURFEW RULES:** For security reasons, all livestock barns will close at 10pm. Barns will remain closed until 6am. Security will be making rounds throughout the night. **No one**, except security personnel, is allowed in the barn while it is closed. All animals must be properly secured when leaving for the night. Violation of this rule may result in disqualification from the species show and/or sale.

#### **4-H/FFA DIVISION SPECIFIC RULES**

14. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion meat pens MUST BE SOLD AT THE LIVESTOCK SALE. Champions of this division will be allowed to sell one (1) large animal as well if they qualify for the sale with that animal.

1. Age of animals in this department will be recorded from December 31, 2024.
2. Any sheep having external parasites will be disqualified and removed from the fairgrounds immediately.
3. In an effort to eradicate scrapie in the United States, USDA requires sheep to have flock identification ear tags that list their flock of origin. All sheep shown at the Delta County Fair must have flock identification ear tags
4. OPEN CLASS – pedigree of sheep in all classes must be awarded in the American and foreign records for the particular breed to which they belong.
5. Wool breeds: Columbia, Correidale, Ramboulet, Merino, other
6. Meat Breeds: Suffolk, Hampshire, Shouthdown, Shropshire, other

#### **4-H/FFA DIVISION SPECIFIC RULES**

**14. Market Sheep must be nominated in the following manner:**

- Market Sheep tag check out and optional tag-in will take place on May 3, 2025 from 8-10 am at the Delta County Fairgrounds in Hotchkiss. Scales will be open, but weighing of animals is optional.
- NO TAGS WILL BE HANDED OUT AFTER THIS DATE. If you fail to pick up tags AND/OR attend the weigh-in/tag-in, at the county fairgrounds you will not be allowed to enter the 2025 Delta County Fair.
- All market animal exhibitors will be required to upload information in 4-HOnline. FOR SHEEP THIS INFORMATION IS DUE BY 4:30 PM ON MAY 9, 2025.
- Two pictures of each animal must be uploaded at the time of nomination: one profile view and one front view clearly showing the Delta County Fair tag in the right ear, unless the ear is untaggable. The exhibitor(s) must be present in at least one photo.
- Any incomplete nominations will not be accepted and will not be allowed to show at the 2025 Delta County Fair. (This includes missing brand inspections and pictures not clearly showing the DCF ear tag as well as the animal).
- NO taggers will be available for individual use, members without tagging equipment should attend weigh-in /tag-in dates provided by the fair board. The tags that will be provided are Y-TEX brand and require Y-TEX taggers to be used when placing them on the animal(s).

**15. BARN CURFEW RULES:** For security reasons, all livestock barns will close at 10pm. Barns will remain closed until 6am. Security will be making rounds throughout the night. **No one**, except security personnel, is allowed in the barn while it is closed. All animals must be properly secured when leaving for the night. Violation of this rule may result in disqualification from the species show and/or sale.

16. **All market lambs must be dry and may have no more than 1" of wool at the time of fair weigh-in.**
17. All sheep must have scrapie tags at initial weigh-in.
18. In all market lamb classes, the front feet of the lamb must remain on the show ring floor while being shown, Judges and superintendents will have discretion to enforce this rule.
19. Pair of Market Lambs – entries are limited to one (1) pair of market lambs per exhibitor.

20. Pen of 3 Market Lambs – entries are unlimited per club/ chapter, but three exhibitors must be represented in each pen group, unless only two members in the club exhibit sheep.

## **JUNIOR DIVISION MARKET SHEEP DELTA COUNTY FAIR BRED & FED RULES:**

8. Eligible ewes must be in ownership by September of the previous kidding/lambing year.
9. Open to any market sheep animal that was lambed and raised in Delta County by a Delta County producer.
10. All Delta County Fair Sheep Bred & Fed animals must contain a scrapie tag with a registered Delta County premises number.
11. All Delta County Fair Sheep Bred & Fed animals must be designated as "Bred & Fed" at the time of initial animal nomination. A signed "Affidavit of Bred & Fed Status" must be uploaded during the animal nomination process per the animal nomination rules above. Exhibitors are responsible for obtaining all required documentation. Delta County producers are no longer required to register as "Bred & Fed Producers" but will need to sign the "Affidavit of Bred & Fed Status". If the "Affidavit of Bred & Fed Status" is found to be falsified in any way, the exhibitor will not be allowed to show in the Market Sheep Show in the following year and, after investigation, if the producer was also involved in the falsification, no animals produced by that producer will be allowed to be considered Bred & Fed for the following year.
12. There will be a Youth Producer Breeding & Market Live Evaluation class following the usual 4-H/FFA Market and Breeding classes during fair for beef, sheep, swine and goats. Exhibitors are eligible to enter this class if they have registered as a Youth Producer through Delta County Bred & Fed, Inc. Requirements and details regarding entry in this program can be found at [www.deltacountybred&fed.com](http://www.deltacountybred&fed.com). Animals will be scored on breeding potential &/or market readiness, respectively. This score will be combined with herdsmanhip and interview scores for overall Youth Producer Awards. No individual awards will be given in this class.
13. Exhibitors who have registered for the Youth Producers Program must designate this on the Delta County Fair Pre-Entry Form in order to participate in this class.

- NO TAGS WILL BE HANDED OUT AFTER THIS DATE. If you fail to pick up tags you will not be allowed to enter the 2025 Delta County Fair.
- All market animal exhibitors will be required to upload information in 4-HOnline. FOR SWINE THIS INFORMATION IS DUE BY 4:30 PM ON MAY 9, 2025.
- Two pictures of each animal must be uploaded at the time of nomination: one profile view and one front view clearly showing the Delta County Fair tag in the right ear, unless the ear is untaggable. The exhibitor(s) must be present in at least one photo.

25. **For show eligibility, hair length on the swine body (hams, top, sides, belly and shoulders) must be at least one-half inch. Swine with body hair length less than one half inch are not eligible for the show. This rule is to satisfy hog processing plant requirements.**

26. **All market swine participating in the Delta County Fair must be ear notched by the producer.**

**JUNIOR DIVISION MARKET SWINE DELTA COUNTY FAIR BRED & FED RULES:**

15. Open to any market swine animal that was farrowed and raised in Delta County by a Delta County producer.

17. All Delta County Fair Swine Bred & Fed animals must be designated as "Bred & Fed" at the time of initial animal nomination. A signed "Affidavit of Bred & Fed Status" must be uploaded during the animal nomination process per the animal nomination rules above. 1. All foods must have been preserved since the last Delta County Fair by the club member in whose name they are entered.
2. All canned products must include the following information on the label:
  - Name of product
  - Method of preparation (type syrup, type pack, any additional ingredients added) as applies to product canned
  - Method of processing (i.e. pressure canner, water bath) and pounds of pressure used if food was pressure canned
  - Elevation at which processing was done
  - Exact processing time
  - Date processed
3. All dried foods must include the following information on the label:
  - Name of product
  - Pretreatment used, if any
  - Names of additional ingredients added, if any
  - Method of drying (oven, solar, etc.)
  - Total drying time
  - Date dried

4. Standard canning jars MUST be used for all canned exhibits. (The brand name, such as Ball or Kerr, imprinted on the side of the jar identifies a standard jar.) All jars must have new two-piece lids. Re-useable lids and one-piece lids are not allowed. Decorative storage containers which have a rubber seal are not acceptable for canning exhibits.
5. While it is best to have screw bands on during transit to and from State Fair, they should be loosened.
6. Submit two jars each of jam or jelly. One jar will be opened and judged; the other will be exhibited.
7. All preserved foods must follow CSU or USDA recommendations. Jams and jellies should be processed in boiling water bath.
8. Any jars showing leaks or spoilage will not be judged.

3. To participate in the Delta County Fair Shoot 4-H Shooting Sports members must bring their COMPLETED record book, signed by a shooting sports instructor, on Fair Shoot Day, unless not competing at Fair. ALL Shooting Sports members, including members who do not compete in the Delta County Fair Shoot must turn their completed record books in to the Delta County Extension Office by published deadline. To

participate in the Delta County Fair Shoot members must also have all 5 certified practices under the direct supervision of a 4-H Certified Shooting Sports Instructor in that discipline. If record books are found to be incomplete, the member will not be allowed to shoot at the County Fair Shoot or participate at the Colorado State Fair.

4. All competitors must have their own currently valid Colorado Hunter Safety Card with them at the shoot site.
5. All competitors must have attended a safety and discipline orientation class and must have all 5 required certified practices in each discipline. Certified practices are defined above in rule #3.
6. Single shooter in a discipline: If there is only one competitor in a given discipline, then that shooter must meet or beat their average score for that year (as documented in their record book) to be eligible for the Grand Champion Award.
7. Champions in each class will receive a different award
8. Ages for classes are classified as follows: Juniors ages 8 – 13 years of age and Seniors ages 14 and up. All ages are determined as of December 31, 2024.

1. The Delta County Fair Association and the Delta County 4-H Shooting Sports Council will offer a PREMIER EXHIBITOR AWARD to one shooting sports project member. Junior, intermediate, and Senior members may enter. Ages for classes are classified as follows: Juniors ages 8 – 13 years of age and Seniors ages 14 and up. All ages are determined as of December 31, 2024.
2. Contestants in the .22 Caliber Rifle, Air Rifle, Air Pistol, Shotgun, Muzzleloader, Archery, and .22 Caliber Pistol disciplines will be evaluated by a composite score from 4 categories and their respective scoring value. The evaluation criteria and scoring system for shooting sports will be based on categories specific to these projects.
3. Member must enter in the Delta County Fair to be eligible for PREMIER EXHIBITOR. (4-H Shooting Sports discipline, General 4-H Exhibits display only and Premier Exhibitor.
4. Members may only enter PREMIER EXHIBITOR in one discipline (i.e. if a member is enrolled in shotgun, muzzleloading, and archery, the member must choose ONE of those three disciplines to enter as PREMIER EXHIBITOR. Entry in more than one discipline will not be allowed. Members will be required to shoot at the Delta County Fair Shoot July 12, 2025 complete a display board or stand-alone project, submit a 70% or more complete record book, and be interviewed by a judge on Friday July 25, 2025. Interview will be about your display board or stand-alone project, as well as your record book.
5. Display items must illustrate something learned in the project this year. Exhibit may be a display board or stand-alone item, such as a quiver, gun case, gun stand, etc. Display items are to be entered in the specific discipline that the exhibit relates to (i.e. air rifle, .22 caliber rifle, shotgun, etc.) The standardized display board size of 4ft x 3 ft is to be used with 4-H projects. No additional items may be included on or in front of a display board. No wooden display cases. 6. No live ammo, broad heads, knives or functional firearms are allowed to be displayed.

1. Exhibitor eligibility, dog eligibility and general rules can be found in the Colorado State Fair 4-H Syllabus, available from the CSU Extension in Delta.
2. Age Requirements: Junior Exhibitor - members who are 10 and under as of Dec 31, 2024. Intermediate Exhibitor - members who are 11-13 as of Dec 31, 2024. Senior Exhibitor - members who are 14 and over as of Dec 31, 2024.
3. All exhibitors must have an up to date 4-H Dog Record Book (to be turned in for judging) and be in good standing with their club 4-H project.

4. Ribbons will be awarded to each 4-H exhibitor in the Sub- Novice class through the Utility class on the following basis:
  - Obedience - Blue Award - 170 or more points earned.
  - Obedience - Red Award - 140 to 169 points earned.
  - Obedience - White Award - 139 or fewer points earned.
  - Showmanship - Blue Award - 85 points or above earned.
  - Showmanship - Red Award - 70 to 84 points earned.
  - Showmanship - White Award - 69 or fewer points earned.
    - The first 5 blue award ribbons in each age division will receive placing ribbons. No ranking of red award ribbons or white award ribbons will be given. These rules apply to both obedience classes and showmanship classes.
    - Champion and Reserve Champion awards in each age division will be determined by combining showmanship, obedience and record bookscores.
    - Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be awarded to the two highest scores over all age divisions. Only two awards will be given.
5. Showmanship classes do not receive premium monies.
6. Adults are not to work ringside with any 4-H member project dog.
7. Adults are not to coach 4-H members while the member is competing in the show ring.
8. Dog show officials can and will dismiss any entrant and/ or their family members from the show for mistreatment of dogs entered in this show or for any violation of the above listed rules.
9. A six-foot leash is required for all sub-novice classes.
10. No female dogs in heat will be allowed in obedience competition.
11. The 4-H dog exhibitor must exhibit control for his/ her dog. Any dog exhibiting aggressive behavior may be excluded from competition by the Superintendent.
12. Acceptable collars are metal or nylon slip type training collars and flat buckle collars. No tags or attachments are allowed.
13. No bait or treats are allowed in obedience competition.
14. Each exhibitor may exhibit a different dog per class, if they meet county qualifications. The same dog cannot be used for different classes. (For example, the same dog may not be shown in Graduate Novice and Open.)

Baked goods need to be brought in on Tuesday by 7:00 PM to have time to be put into place for judging, unless arrangements are made with the superintendent(s) to be brought in on Wednesday by 8:30 AM.
7. All decisions are at the discretion of the Pantry Store Superintendent and the Heritage Hall Superintendent.
8. Judging will be on Wednesday, July 31st beginning at 9:00 AM and is open to the public.
9. An exhibitor may enter more than one item in a class as long as they are different products.
10. At the discretion of the Pantry Store Superintendent(s) and/or judge(s), new classes may be added at the time of judging to ensure all items get judged properly. Items entered incorrectly may be moved to the correct section and class. Items determined unsuitable by judges may be disqualified.

5. Meat or main dish pies must have a pie crust and be labeled either "homemade crust" or "store-bought crust". Superintendent(s) must be notified if it is a meat or main dish pie for proper storage for the safety of our judges.
6. All baked items must be from scratch unless otherwise specified in class listings.

#### HOMEMADE CHEESE RULES:

1. All cheeses must be made from pasteurized milk and be produced with the highest of hygiene and care for the judge's safety.
2. Cheese must be labeled as to the type of cheese, rennet (animal or non-animal) and any added ingredients (i.e. herbs, flavors).

10. When there are an extreme number of items in a class, the judge and/or superintendent(s) shall be allowed to make sub-classifications.
11. An item for which a class is provided may not be entered in "any other article" class.
12. If the judge raises questions regarding the age of an exhibit, elimination or lower placing in the class can result if the judge so chooses.

14. A disabled person who wishes to be considered in a separate class should indicate so by writing "D" after the class number.

16. An individual shall place a needlework item in the professional category if the individual sells their work. This will be designated with a "P" after the class number.
